A family club was organized in Toronto in 1945 by Beryl Rose, who saw 11 of his 13 surviving children move from Russia to Canada by the 1920s. Joe, the only surviving son of Beryl and his wife Mintz, said his father (and older brother, Nathan) "wanted (the) family to stay together." After Beryl died later in 1945 (his wife died in 1933), the sons kept the organization alive. "We are still together," he added. "That's what it's all about."

During the reunion dinner, toasts were proposed, telegrams from city, provincial and federal politicians were read, and speeches were made, as Larry Rose (Joe's son) acted as master of ceremonies. After various awards were presented, movies of old club anniversary parties, held in various locations every five years, were shown and old pictures were displayed. One week before the reunion, members of the family met at the home of Marilyn and Marvin Cohen to discuss plans for the event and to reminisce about their large family. It was obvious from the spirited discussions concerning dates, names and past events that the reunion was going to be a lively affair. It was also slightly confusing to keep track of just how each person was related, since some of the children of the patriarch Beryl and mother Mintz were the same age as their nieces and nephews.

Through the stories pieced together by Joe Rose (son of Beryl and Mintzi), Sarah Koszorek, Ida and Saul Shafer, and Dave Rose (grandchildren) and Marilyn and Marvin Cohen and Sheldon and Ruth Rose (great grandchildren), the history gradually emerged.

The Roses, formerly the Temnyagorod family, lived in the town of Pullen in the Ukraine, seven kilometres from the Polish border. Beryl and Mintze had 15 children, two of whom died in infancy. The 13 surviving children, with an age span of over 20 years between the oldest and youngest, were Nathan, Chasi, Sime, Louis, Max, Leah, Bella, Chya, Abie, Gussie, Jennie, Simeon and Joe. (Bella, Chya, Bussie, Jennie and Joe are still living.)

Beryl was able to bribe Russian officials to keep his oldest son out of the army, since Jews were called to serve for 25 years. Louis and Max escaped to Canada in 1913, because their father did not have enough money to bribe the officials to keep

them out. In Halifax, an immigration officer told Max, "You can't have that [last] name . . . I'll give you a good honest name," and the officer gave him his own name — Rose.

In 1920, Bella, Leah and a cousin joined their brothers in Toronto. Nathan arrived in 1921 with his wife and child. The rest of the brothers and sisters, except for two, arrived in 1922 with their parents, and the family went to live on Leonard Ave. Eventually, they moved around the Jewish section of Toronto to Cecil St. and Grange St.

Two sisters, Chasi and Sima, who were married and had children, died in Russia during World War II.

Beryl owned a tailor shop and yard goods store in Russia and the family went into the needle trade and linen supply business in Toronto.
